Where, when: Allans Beach, Otago Peninsula, Dunedin, January 2021

Sustainability? I arrived at the Allans Beach carpark on the Otago Peninsula to photograph the wildlife and found this row of pine trees had been felled. I started photographing the scarred trunks from the chainsaw's teeth and then found this dislodged nest near the base of one tree. It reminded me of the huge variety of life in the canopies of trees, not just birds that are lost during this process.

Renewal is part of life's cycles so tree felling in itself is not just a threat to the environment – it also provides an opportunity for another plant to grow. What matters is whether the ecological disturbance imposed by felling and other extractive uses is too severe or frequent for the natural systems to remain resilient.
