

Title: "Lion King"

Where, when: Hakapupu (Pleasant River estuary), September 2021

Sustainability? This is an adolescent male, probably around 4 years old. He's about 90% of full size —

the large "Beach master" males can weigh up to 450 kg. They can move surprisingly

quickly on land, so stay well back if you can.

The New Zealand sea lion numbers around 12,000 and is one of the world's rarest sea lion species. They are the only species of the genus *Phocarctos*. This is a common pattern amongst New Zealand 'endemic' species – that's lifeforms that are found nowhere else. New Zealand has a high proportion of endemic species and their uniqueness is expressed at a high level in their phylogeny (evolutionary classification

tree) i.e. it's not unusual for the New Zealand species to be the only member of its family, or occasionally even its order of species. These high levels of endemism result from a long period of isolation from the planets main landmasses and the consequent "divergent" evolution of our plants and animals. This is important in two main ways: firstly, our biodiversity is so remarkably different that it is particularly important that it is sustained; secondly, we have sole responsibility to ensure their survival - no one else have populations to safeguard them from extinction; and thirdly, their behaviour and population characteristics make them extremely vulnerable to competition and predation by introduced species and to habitat modification.

It's a thrill to me to see these animals returning to the New Zealand mainland. It can sometimes get depressing to hear about one species after another going down ... for a change, here's a story of hope and gratitude for those working hard to restore their numbers.
