

Title: "Fog Over Farmland"

**Description:** Fog, Aramoana, Dunedin

Where, when: Aramoana, Dunedin, January 2021.

Sustainability? This was just a beautiful sight – landscapes, especially when folded in atmospheric effects, become part of one's sense of home and place. Giving and using names to places and features of the landscape is important for reminding us of our history and connection to this place. The cliffs from Aramoana, Long Beach and west to Purakaunui and Blueskin Bay are known to the mana whenua (local Māori) as Te Pari Rehu, "The misty cliffs". Aramoana means pathway to the sea. Photographs remind us of the beauty of our own place and motivate us to stay and look after the place.

## **Photo notes:**

I often travel up to Mt Cargill here in Dunedin for the 360 degree views, the Peninsula, Dunedin City, south as far as Nugget Point, west to the Maniototo and then North to East Otago.

This morning a thick fog was flowing over the landscape from Waitati to the Otago Harbour. I set up my camera on a tripod and pointed it towards the farm land above Aramoana. I set the aperture and metering options and then let the camera decide on shutter speed which was 30 seconds. It is always exciting to see what pops up on the screen after a long exposure, something that is invisible to the eye.

Exposure 30s at 200 mm focal length, f/5 aperture and ISO-200.
